My teacher explained that a compliment is when someone says something nice about you or what you've done



Compliments can make people feel happy, proud, and appreciated



I can give a compliment when I notice something nice about someone, like their clothes, drawing, or a kind thing they did



To give a compliment, I can say, 'I like your...' or 'You're really good at...'



If someone gives me a compliment, I can look at them, smile, and say, 'Thank you!'



I don't need to feel shy or embarrassed about receiving a compliment. It's a kind thing to hear!



If I'm not sure what to say, I can always start with, 'That's nice of you to say!'



Giving compliments isn't just about how someone looks. I can also notice their kind actions, like helping others



Sometimes, people might not know how to respond to a compliment, and that's okay



Giving compliments shows that I'm kind and notice good things about others



I can practice giving compliments to my family, friends, and teachers

Comprehension

- What is a compliment?

Open-Ended Questions

Creative Activity

- **Compliment Chain**

Create a paper chain where each link has a compliment written on it, like "You are kind!" or "You are good at drawing!" Add a new link every time the child gives or receives a compliment

- **Compliment Cards**

Help the child make small cards with kind messages, such as "Great job!" or "You're a good friend!" They can give these cards to friends, family, or teachers



Role-Play Activity

- **Scenario 1**

Pretend the child sees a friend's drawing. Practice saying, "I like your drawing!" and the friend saying, "Thank you!"

- **Scenario 2**

Act out a situation where the child finishes a puzzle. Practice a friend saying, "You're great at puzzles!" and the child replying, "That's nice of you to say, thank you!"

- **Scenario 3**

Pretend the child wants to compliment a teacher. Practice saying, "I think you're a great teacher!"
