



**Sometimes, I see people I want to talk to, but I'm not sure what to say**



**Starting a conversation is a great way to make friends and share ideas**



---

**When I want to start a conversation, I can smile and make eye contact with the person**



---

**Next, I can say something polite, like, 'Hi, my name is [Name]. What's your name?'**



**I can also start a conversation by asking a question, like, 'What game are you playing?'**



**If I see someone reading or drawing, I can say, 'That looks interesting! Can you tell me about it?'**



---

**Sometimes, I can share something about myself, like, 'I love playing soccer. Do you like soccer too?'**



---

**If the person responds, I can listen carefully and keep the conversation going by asking more questions**



**If the person seems busy or doesn't want to talk, that's okay. I can try again another time**



**I can practice starting conversations with my family, friends, or teachers to feel more confident**



**Using kind words, smiling, and being polite makes conversations fun and enjoyable for everyone**



**If I accidentally interrupt someone while they're talking, I can say, 'I'm sorry, please continue'**



**Sometimes, it helps to notice what others are talking about before joining in**



**Starting conversations helps me make new friends, share my thoughts, and learn new things**



Now, when I want to talk to someone, I know how to smile, say hi, and start a friendly conversation



Starting conversations makes me feel happy and helps others feel happy too!

## Comprehension

- What is the first step to starting a conversation?

## Creative Activity

- **Make a Conversation Starter Chart**

Help the child list or draw different ways to start a conversation, like saying "Hi" or asking a question

- **Draw a Friendly Scene**

Ask the child to draw themselves talking to someone and practicing a conversation starter



## Role-Play Activity

- **Scenario 1**

Pretend the child sees someone playing with a toy they like. Practice saying, "Hi, what are you playing with?"

- **Scenario 2**

Act out a situation where the child wants to join a group at lunch. Practice smiling, waving, and saying, "Hi, can I sit with you?"

- **Scenario 3**

Pretend the child meets someone new at the park. Practice saying, "Hi, my name is [Name]. What's your name?"
