they're done.**



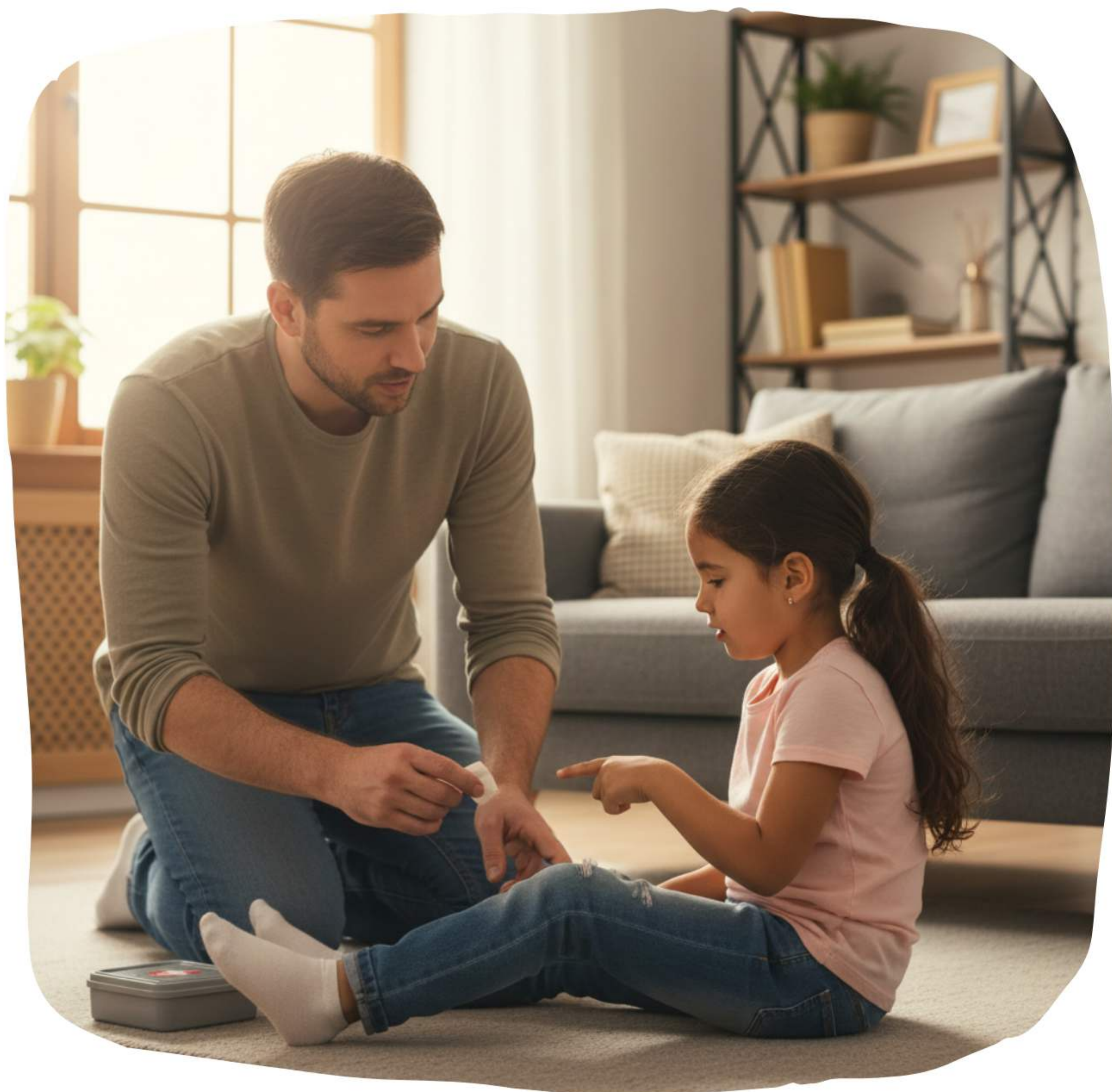
**I can share toys and equipment, like the

If I feel tired, frustrated, or hurt, I can tell my parent or an adult right away.



When it's time to leave, I listen to the adult's instructions and stop playing calmly.



I can say, “Goodbye, playground! See you next time!” before leaving.



Following the playground rules keeps everyone safe and makes playtime more fun.



I can be proud when I play nicely, share, and take turns with others.



Every time I visit the park or playground, I can have fun, stay safe, and be a kind friend!

Role-Play Activity

- **Scenario 1**

Pretend you're waiting for your turn on the swing.

☞ Practice standing in line and saying, "I'll wait for my turn."

- **Scenario 2**

Pretend someone wants to play with your ball.

☞ Practice saying, "Sure, we can take turns!"

- **Scenario 3**

Pretend you see a "No Pushing" sign.

☞ Practice keeping your hands to yourself while waiting.

- **Scenario 4**

Pretend you got tired or thirsty.

☞ Practice sitting on a bench and saying, "I need a water break."
