



Sometimes at school or in public places, I have to wait in line — like for lunch, the bus, or a turn on the swing.



Waiting in line means standing one behind another and taking turns. Everyone gets a turn if we wait patiently.



When I wait patiently, I show respect, self-control, and good manners.



Sometimes, waiting can feel hard. I might feel bored or excited to move faster. That's okay!



I can remind myself, “My turn will come soon.” This helps me stay calm while I wait.



While waiting, I keep my hands to myself and my feet still.



I do not push, cut in line, or move around too much — that can make others upset.



If someone in front of me is slow, I can stay patient and give them space.



I can quietly look around, think about something I like, or count numbers to pass the time.



When it's almost my turn, I can get ready by holding what I need — like my lunch tray, ticket, or bag.



When it's finally my turn, I can step forward with a smile and do what I came for.



After my turn, I can move aside quietly so the next person can go.



If I ever feel impatient, I can take a deep breath and think about how nice it feels to be calm.



My teachers and parents feel proud when I wait my turn politely.



Waiting patiently helps everyone stay safe, organized, and happy in public places.



Each time I wait patiently in line, I show kindness, respect, and responsibility — and that makes me feel proud!

Role-Play Activity

- **Scenario 1**

Pretend you're waiting in line for lunch.

☞ Practice standing quietly, holding your tray, and smiling while you wait.

- **Scenario 2**

Pretend someone accidentally bumps into you in line.

☞ Practice staying calm and saying, "That's okay," instead of pushing back.

- **Scenario 3**

Pretend the line is moving slowly.

☞ Practice taking a deep breath and counting quietly to 10.

- **Scenario 4**

Pretend it's finally your turn at the playground slide.

☞ Practice stepping forward calmly and saying, "My turn now!"
