



Sometimes, I go for walks with my parents, teachers, or another adult — to school, the park, or other places.



When I walk with an adult, they help keep me safe. My job is to stay close and listen carefully.



Before we start walking, I can look around and notice where we are — like streets, cars, or crowds.



If we are near a road, I stay on the sidewalk and hold the adult's hand or the side of their bag or stroller.



I never run ahead, even if I'm excited. Running near traffic or crowds can be dangerous.



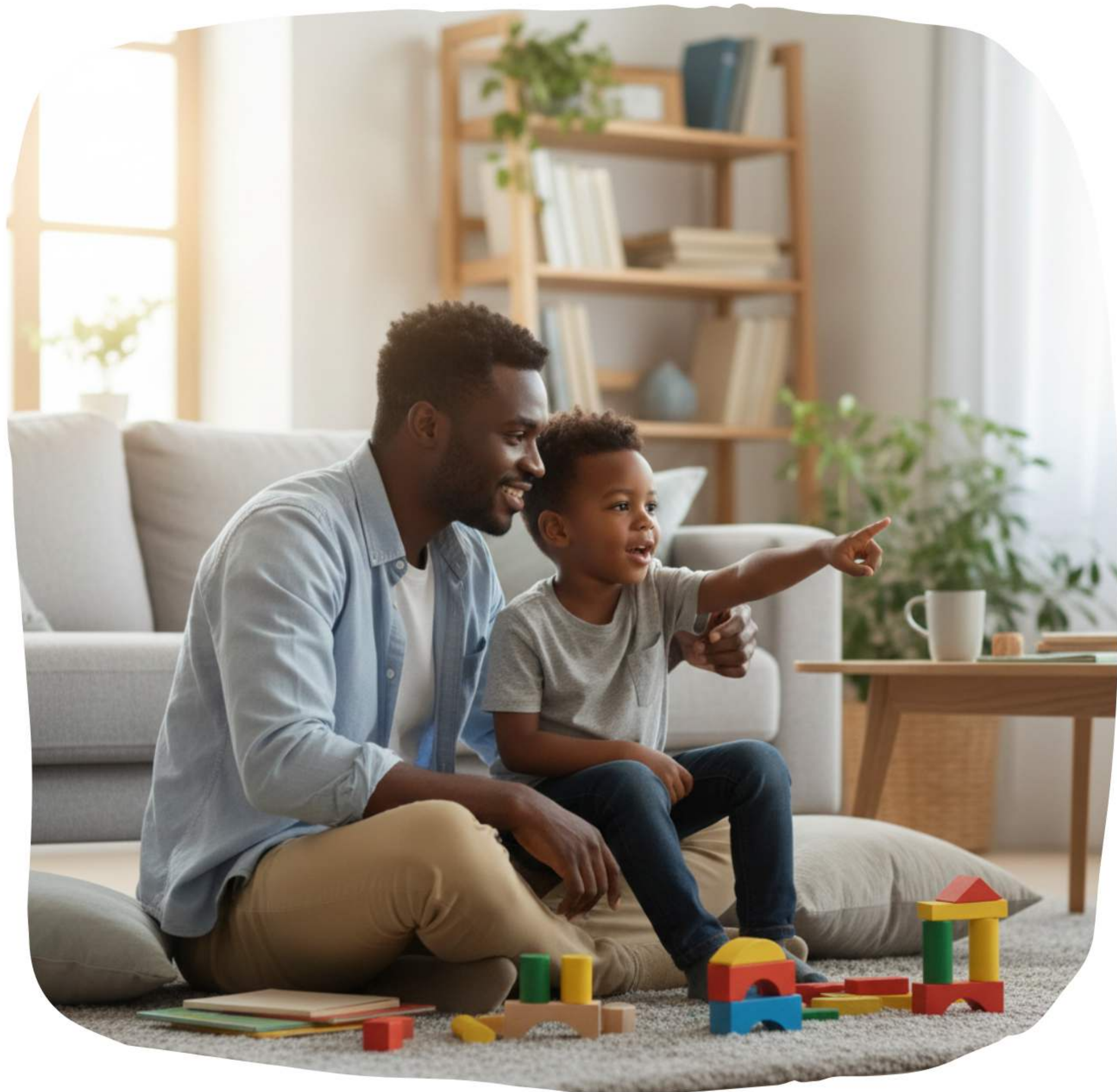
When we come to a road, I stop, look, and wait until the adult says it's safe to cross.



I look left, right, and left again to make sure no cars are coming.



I walk across the street slowly and carefully, never running or playing.



If I see something interesting, I can tell the adult instead of walking off on my own.



When walking in busy places like malls or parks, I stay beside the adult so I don't get lost.



If I ever can't see the adult, I stop where I am and call their name — I don't run or wander.



I can hold hands when crossing streets or walking near parking lots. It helps me stay close and safe.



Sometimes the adult may remind me, “Stay close” or “Hold my hand.” That’s my cue to listen right away.



When I walk safely with an adult, I show that I can follow directions and be responsible.



Staying safe means watching where I'm going, listening carefully, and walking, not running.



Every time I walk safely with an adult, I keep myself protected and make everyone proud!

Role-Play Activity

- **Scenario 1**

Pretend you're walking to the park with your parent.

☞ Practice staying close and holding their hand.

- **Scenario 2**

Pretend you see something interesting across the street.

☞ Practice stopping, pointing, and saying, "Can we go see that?" instead of running.

- **Scenario 3**

Pretend you're at a crosswalk waiting for the signal.

☞ Practice stopping, looking both ways, and walking calmly when the adult says, "Let's go."

- **Scenario 4**

Pretend you're walking in a mall and can't see your parent.

☞ Practice standing still and calling softly, "Mom!" or "Dad!"
